Intervene early when they do arise




Mitigate the negative impact of these circumstances throughout the life course by creating a healthy and supportive environment




Consequences of vulnerability: evidence in Surrey

9.18% increase in permanent exclusions (2018-19)



Across the county, approximately **1 in 5 children** live in poverty (Average based on constituency figures across Surrey developed by End Child Poverty)



Of those young people with court outcomes, 64% have Special Education Needs



Violence against the person accounts for 26% of all Youth Offences in Surrey (in quarter 2 of 2020)


